After her mother's death in 2017, Sheila and Dan realized that they wanted others to experience the happiness of pet and 1:1 visits, so they started to volunteer. They brought their special brand of sunshine week after week. As Shelia says "if you can then do." The threesome became a much anticipated and appreciated addition to the Foss family. Then 2020 came and everything stopped.

Already exemplary volunteers Covid restrictions only seemed to strengthen their resolve. They brightened our days in a multitude of ways. When only staff were allowed in our building the McKinneys started sending cards to the Residents with Meryl's picture on them every other month to let the Residents know they were not forgotten. Sheila collected vases small enough to fit on Residents bedside tables and filled them with fresh flowers. Donations of bags of candy and bouquets of flowers were given to our staff to show their appreciation for all their extraordinary efforts.

As the rules relaxed, the dedicated duo jumped back into volunteering. Upon returning one our Residents told them how receiving their cards "felt so good because it meant someone was thinking of you". There was no hesitation when asked to follow the new protocol for Foss volunteers. After Sheila learned she was now required to wear a face shield she bedazzled the top to make it look like a crown. When we progressed to wearing just eye protection Sheila put sparkly stickers on her glasses and Dan brought in packages of unused googles for the volunteers to wear. Today, Dan, Shelia and Meryl continue their weekly trips to Foss because as Shelia says "while we can't change everything that is wrong with the world you can fix the stuff in front of you". We are so fortunate to have them and all our other volunteers who bring their own form of radiance into our Resident's lives.
